




Unauthorized immigrant population in the U.S., in millions





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- Existing studies on undocumented migrants are based on when migrants stop being undocumented.
 - Impact of regularization policies
 (Pinotti, 2017; Fasani, 2018; Comino et al., 2020; Bahar et al, 2021)

- Lack of evidence on how to improve migrants' integration while they are undocumented.

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 - When migrants are smuggled and under criminal control, they reinforce organized crime (Dipoppa, 2025).
- Nonetheless, limited understanding of how to fight against labor exploitation.
- → Difficulty: hard to crack downs on exploitative labor if migrants do not report those exploiting them.

Under what conditions is it possible to crack down on migrant labor exploitation?

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- If they are under criminal control, they risk organized crime retaliation against themselves and their networks.

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- Mitigating the risks of reporting might change the balance in favor of speaking up.

Evaluate a new type of multi-dimensional intervention fighting against migrant labor exploitation in Italy.

Migrant labor racketeering

- Illegal recruitment and control of migrants.
- Often relies on organized crime intermediation.
 - Migrants' smuggling.
 - Enforcement of informal labor contracts with threats of retaliation.
- Not only in agriculture and not only in Italy.
 - E.g. Mexican migrants in agriculture in California.
 - E.g., Organized crime-controlled labor racketeering in services and constructions in the Arab Gulf countries.

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


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- 72% presents diseases they did not have at the start of the employment.
- Migrant protesting the system have been victims of organized crime violence.



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
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Multidimensional intervention: Pic

- Legal assistance to report.
- Incentives: help in applying for a legal residence permit for being victim of exploitation. Ref

Estimation Strategy

Main specification: Exploit staggered roll-out of treatment in a diff-in-diffs design.

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
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PS Matching and Synth DID Design

News on labor racketeering in 7 national newspapers of different political slant.

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

▶ Increase by 4 news in 1,000 inhabitants (10-20 fold wrt average).

Magnitude

Do news talk about migrants reporting?

I read and classify news in treated cities.

- 29%: Migrants denouncing or police operations against labor exploitation;
- 22%: Demonstrations by migrants or by the civil society;
- 22%: Journalistic reports;
- 19%: Policymaking initiatives to fight this phenomenon.

⇒ Increase in news driven by both reporting and civil society activism.

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It is not driven by coverage of the union campaign. Mention of the unions are balanced across treatment and control.

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 - Hard to prosecute employers if migrants do not testify;
- Placebo locations where unions collected information on exploitation, but did not lead the intervention with migrants. \rightarrow Null effect. Placebo DID

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Spillovers on Organized Crime Prosecution


Were there spillovers on counter-mafia activity?

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▶ Increase of 1.2 or 1.3 more goods seized to organized crime


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
Leverage ITANES survey taking place in treated locations before and after treatment. After treatment, the same respondent becomes:

- > 9% less likely to report anti-immigration sentiments.
- ▶ 2-3% more likely to vote for far-left. (no clear change in other parties)
- ► Change in voting not driven by change in trust for unions.

▶ 1% increase in vote share for far-left. Vote Share





Robustness

- Treatment heterogeneity:
 - de Chaisemartin d'Haultfoeuille, Callaway and Sant'Anna, Borusyak et al., Sun and Abraham
 - Stacked design (Deshpande and Li, 2020) N P V
- Treatment definition:
 - Duration of treatment
 - Drop first years of treatment Tab
 - Drop one obs at a time (no simultaneous treatment)
- Size of treated sample:
 - P-values from Fisher randomization inference. Tab
 - Conley and Taber 2011 confidence intervals.
- Multiple hypothesis testing.
- Compare only within-treated units for voting. Compare within treated units

Limitations

- Lack good measure of attacks against migrants.
- Lack of micro-evidence into the mechanisms of political activation.
- How do migrants become engaged with the state, with other migrants, and with civil society?



- Question: Does access to basic health services spur engagement with state institutions and citizens, and improve integration outcomes?

Conclusions

- 1 Focus on the integration of undocumented migrants.
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 - → Fighting migrants exploitation directly undermines organized crime by reducing their profits and unveiling their activities.

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- 3 Public opinion literature: who "deserves" integration.
 - Recent studied: vulnerability improves attitudes (Bansak et al., 2016).
 - → Effects on behavioral outcomes (voting).

Residence permit for humanitarian motives

- Regulated by D.Lgs. 286/1998 in Italy, but existent in other countries.
- Can apply to victims of labor exploitation, sexual exploitation, domestic violence, natural calamity, health reasons, heroic acts.
- The permit is easily released by the Questore (province-level chief police).
- Its renewal is subject to the opinion of a specific Commission.
- It allows working and can be converted into permanent.
- Was considerably restricted in 2020.




Parallel Trends Test: Labor Racketeering News





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
Parallel Trends Test: Labor Racketeering News, Matching





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Parallel Trends Test: Seized properties





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
Protests and judicial activation (quotes)

"The strike of North African workers continues for the sixth consecutive day. These migrants, who pick tomatoes in the fields, protest against low wages and illegal hiring practices, and promise to continue to cross their arms until their requests will be met. The DDA (judicial investigative unit) in Lecce has opened an investigation on the exploitation of immigrants in the fields of Nardò. There are several complaints on the part of the workers, including of people who have been threatened with death by the racketeers." (La Repubblica, August 2011).

"The arrests were in the air for months. It made a lot of noise, during the last summer, the fight of the workers in Masseria Boncuri, a shanty town which every June is populated by migrants living the inferno of the farmlands. They bear 10-12 working hours under a scorching sun, paid 20-25 euros at best, below the poverty line. (Il Fatto Quotidiano, 2012)




Parallel Trends Test: Destined properties






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Voting, elections 1 year from treatment

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Magnitude

- From 2012 to 2014, the union engaged with 21,442 migrant workers.
- (estimated) overall 47,761 migrants were likely reached by the campaign.
- Other intervention to persuade activated 3.4 percent of respondents.
- Assuming even a third of this effect, 4,776 migrants are likely to explain 0.7 more news items per year.








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Properties seized, robust to treatment heterogeneity


